











Track Day - May 3, 2008

Please join us on May 3rd at 10:00
AM for a car / kart Track Day at
Jackson County Sports Park's go
kart track. NOT an autocross but a
fun day for you to take your car on
the track. Get your best time in your
daily driver then try it again in a
real, full race kart capable of speeds
in excess of 60 mph, although it
feels much faster with your rear end



2 inches off the ground! With only about 10% of the horsepower available in your daily driver you might be surprised to find your lap times are quicker in these diminutive, purpose built racing machines.

Cost per driver (not per car) is \$35. Although this is being offered as a "compare your car to a kart" event, driver's can forego either vehicle if they choose so if you don't want to track your car you can still try the course in one of the karts.

This event is NOT affiliated with PCA in any way. Drivers will participate in this event entirely at their own risk. Signed waivers will be required for each participant and helmets are required for both the cars and karts. Some helmets will be available at the track. There will be a tech inspection for each car before it is allowed on the track. Only one car or kart will be on the track at any one time. Two 3 lap sessions for cars and two 3 lap sessions for karts, preceded by a briefing on kart operation and safety.

This is a DRY event only. Karts with racing slicks can not be driven on a wet track.



Failure to receive a sufficient number of participants will result in cancellation of the event.

Tech Session - Tool list

With the request for more technical related articles, I thought it would be good to first talk about some of the tools that might be necessary for our at-home repairs. I don't know who to give credit to for the following list, but I am sure the author is out there somewhere. Thanks anonymous author.

HAMMER: Originally employed as a weapon of war, the hammer nowadays is used as a kind of divining rod to locate expensive parts not far from the object we are trying to hit.

MECHANIC'S KNIFE: Used to open and slice through the contents of cardboard cartons delivered to your front door; works particularly well on boxes containing leather seats

ELECTRIC HAND DRILL: Normally used for spinning steel Pop rivets in their holes until you die of old age, but it also works great for drilling mounting holes in fenders just above the brake line that goes to the rear wheel.

PLIERS: Used to round off bolt heads.

HACKSAW: One of a family of cutting tools built on the Ouija board principle. It transforms human energy into a crooked, unpredictable motion, and the more you attempt to influence its course, the more dismal your future becomes.

VISE-GRIPS: Used to round off bolt heads. If nothing else is available, they can also be used to transfer intense welding heat to the palm of your hand.

OXYACETYLENE TORCH: Used almost entirely for lighting various flammable objects in your garage on fire. Also handy for igniting the grease inside a brake drum you're trying to get the bearing race out of.

DRILL PRESS: A tall upright machine useful for suddenly snatching flat metal bar stock out of your hands so that it smacks you in the chest and flings your beer across the room, splattering it against that freshly painted part you were drying.

WIRE WHEEL: Cleans rust off old bolts and then throws them somewhere under the workbench with the speed of light. Also removes fingerprint whorls and hard-earned guitar calluses in about the time it takes you to say, "Ouch...."

HYDRAULIC FLOOR JACK: Used for lowering a car to the ground

after you have installed your new front disk brake setup, trapping the jack handle firmly under the front fender.

EIGHT-FOOT LONG DOUGLAS FIR 2X4: Used for levering a car upward off a hydraulic jack.

TWEEZERS: A tool for removing wood splinters.

PHONE: Tool for calling your neighbor to see if he has another hydraulic floor jack.

E-Z OUT BOLT AND STUD EXTRACTOR: A tool that snaps off in bolt holes and is ten times harder than any known drill bit.

TIMING LIGHT: A stroboscopic instrument for illuminating grease buildup.

TWO-TON HYDRAULIC ENGINE HOIST: A handy tool for testing the tensile strength of ground straps and brake lines you may have forgotten to disconnect.

CRAFTSMAN 1/2 x 16-INCH SCREWDRIVER: A large motor mount prying tool that inexplicably has an accurately machined screwdriver tip on the end without the handle.

BATTERY ELECTROLYTE TESTER: A handy tool for transferring sulfuric acid from a car battery to the inside of your toolbox after determining that your battery is dead as a doornail, just as you thought.


TROUBLE LIGHT: The mechanic's own tanning booth. Sometimes called a drop light, it is a good source of vitamin D, "the sunshine vitamin," which is not otherwise found under cars at night. Health benefits aside, it's main purpose is to consume 40-watt light bulbs at about the same rate that 105-mm howitzer shells might be used during, say, the first few hours of the Battle of the Bulge. More often dark than light, its name is somewhat misleading.

PHILLIPS SCREWDRIVER: Normally used to stab the lids of oldstyle paper-and-tin oil cans and splash oil on your shirt; can also be used, as the name implies, to round off Phillips screw heads.

AIR COMPRESSOR: A machine that takes energy produced in a coal-burning power plant 200 miles away and transforms it into compressed air that travels by hose to a Chicago Pneumatic impact wrench that grips rusty bolts last tightened 60 years ago by someone in Springfield, and rounds them off.

PRY BAR: A tool used to crumple the metal surrounding that clip or bracket you needed to remove in order to replace a 50 cent part.

HOSE CUTTER: A tool used to cut hoses 1/2 inch too short.

ers as the answer to the Corvette and the Thunderbird. It had an Italian built aluminum body and used the company's 195 CID 6 cyl




